

COVID updates

Revised Emergency Regulations



On Dec. 10, the New York State Department of Health revised their emergency regulations requiring individuals to wear face coverings for all indoor public places in an effort to combat the transmission of COVID-19.

We appreciate your support as we continue to enforce the layered mitigation strategies that we utilize every day to keep our staff and students healthy. Please know that the state's

masking requirement is extended to any gathering on school grounds, including athletic contests, clubs and activities, community programs, and board of education meetings.

In addition, the revised regulations clarify that schools may now accept antigen OR PCR testing to allow people to participate in school following COVID-19 symptoms. In order to accommodate our school community, we will still be holding COVID-19 testing clinics for students who need to provide proof of a negative test to return back to school.

Booster vaccines

Some community members have inquired about booster vaccinations and if or when their child might be eligible. Booster vaccinations are an important step to help assure protection against current strains of COVID-19, including the Delta and Omicron variants. Booster vaccines can be given six months following the second dose of a COVID-19 vaccination and are now approved for all ages 16 years and older.

Mental health, physical well-being, and social emotional learning are essential to our students, staff, families and learning community, so our districtwide mental health team has collected several resources to create a Virtual Calming Room.



There are nine different rooms with a variety of tools and activities, including:

- sounds and music.
- visual relaxation,
- mindfulness and guided meditations,
- coloring and drawing,
- games and puzzles,
- live animal cams,
- virtual field trips,
- movement, and
- resources.



In February 2019, Dr. Tami Sullivan also visited our district to present "From Worrier to Warrior". This presentation provides the neuroscience of anxiety, as well as several strategies for managing high levels of stress and anxiety. Instructional update: emergency relief funds accelerate transition to MTSS

Spencerport has been working towards transitioning to a Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS) in recent years.

MTSS is grounded in the belief that all students can learn. It further provides educators with a framework that is responsive to the academic and behavioral needs of all students. MTSS focuses on evidence-based practices, relies on student progress data to inform instructional decisions and ensures that each student, based on their unique needs, receives the level and type of support necessary to be successful.

MTSS grew out of two other intervention-based frameworks: Response to Intervention (RtI) and Positive Behavior Intervention & Support (PBIS), both of which are long-standing programs in the district. Ultimately, MTSS will incorporate current practices, both academic and social emotional, into a streamlined system to best support the whole child.

The timeline to implement MTSS took a leap forward with federal stimulus funding, particularly the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Funds. Four Teacher on Special Assignment (TOSA) positions have been created to act as MTSS coaches at the K-5 level.

One MTSS coach is assigned to each elementary school, with the primary focus in this first year is Response to Intervention. The RtI program is a data-driven analysis that ensures equitable response to student needs across schools and demographics.

"We work closely with teachers to identify students' needs, plan and implement support, and monitor those interventions so that we can document how students are progressing toward their individualized learning goals," said MTSS coach for Munn Elementary School Hannah Hill.

In addition, our MTSS coaches can help bring classroom teachers and interventionists together to unify individual plans to support a student's growth. Standardizing this process with measurable data will ensure consistency districtwide.

Coaches are currently working on math and ELA learning goals, in many cases identifying unfinished learning due to pandemic shutdowns. As their work continues over the next three years, the district will grow the MTSS initiative to include behavioral interventions. Ultimately, MTSS will encompass RtI, PBIS, and Restorative Practices and help deliver the best supports to individual students throughout the district.


