Dear Spencerport Families,

On Tuesday, May 16, all qualified residents of the Spencerport Central School District will have the opportunity to vote on the 2023-24 school budget as well as elect three Board of Education members. For the last few weeks, I have traveled around our community and schools and given a total of 11 presentations on the budget. This has been a great opportunity to share the priorities reflected in this budget, listen to feedback and answer questions. A section of our website has been dedicated to publishing commonly asked questions and addressing any inaccuracies that may be causing confusion. So far topics have ranged from the impact of the Amazon facility to smaller class sizes. The FAQ may be found at this link.

To ensure that individuals have the information they need to make informed decisions, we have mailed our Cornerstone Budget Newsletter to all residents. ## **Updates**

#### NYSED restarts accountability system

As I shared with you a few weeks ago, the NYS Education Department is restarting its accountability system. A new system has been implemented to evaluate schools and districts including new accountability designations. As a reminder, this is a requirement under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), which governs federal K-12 public education policy throughout the country.



I am pleased to share with you that the Spencerport Central School District and all of its schools have been given the "Local Support & Improvement" (LSI) designation. This was previously referred to as "Good Standing" and is the highest designation a school district can receive. As I shared with you in the past, we are committed to ensuring that our students are receiving a high-quality education at all grade levels. Continuous improvement remains our focus as a district and we will strive for progress in all areas of our organization.

- walk the hallways,
- visit key locations such as the main office, cafeteria, and auditorium, and most importantly

These tours, which continue next week, prove to be an invaluable experience for our students as they begin to prepare for middle school.



### 7th graders get creative with building castles

Seventh grade students in Ms. Hasselberg's math class have been learning how to determine the volume of 3D shapes such as cylinders, rectangular and triangular prisms, cubes, cones and spheres. At the end of the unit, as a culminating and creative assessment, the students were tasked to:

- 1. create a 2D blueprint of a castle that they would like to build
- 2. fold the flat paper "nets" of each shape into the 3D models of each respective shape
- 3. use those 3D shapes to construct, color and create a detailed 3D castle, and
- 4. measure and calculate the total volume of their entire model, showing all their work.

In addition, the class opted to make it a competition, with all students on the Delta team casting their votes on their first, second and third favorite castles. The winners' projects are now on

display in the school, with first place being the Candyland Castle.

"I cannot tell you the joy and learning that came from doing this project!" Ms. Hasselberg said. "They really got creative and constructed some amazing castles, complete with moats, draw bridges, Lego pirate ships and dragons!"

## **Upcoming events**

### May 26: Students to be dismissed 15 minutes early for drill

As part of our emergency planning each year, the district is required by the state to conduct an early release drill where the students are transported home no earlier than 15 minutes prior than the end of the school day. This early release drill will take place on Friday, May 26. On that afternoon, buses will depart from each building 15 minutes prior to their normal departure time and bring students home as if on their normal route.

The purpose of the early dismissal drill is to test the effectiveness of our transportation and communication systems in the event of an emergency. We are notifying you in advance of the drill so that they can be prepared for your students to be dismissed early and arrive home by bus early on May 26.
